Do You Know Where Your Conservation Dollars Come From?

The Federal Aid in Wildlife Restoration Act, aka Pittman-Robertson Act, passed in 1937, applies an 11% excise tax on sporting arms and ammunition. This includes pistols, revolvers, bows, crossbows, arrows, and archery parts. Money is then distributed back to the states for population studies, habitat improvement, species introductions, wildlife research, hunter education, and the building and maintenance of public shooting ranges.

The <u>Dingell-Johnson Act</u>, passed in 1950 and modeled after the Pittman-Robertson Act, applies an excise tax on fishing tackle, tax on motorboat fuels, and import duties on fishing tackle and recreational watercraft. More than \$20 billion dollars have been raised for the management of fish populations, including boating access facilities, wetlands restoration, boat safety, public education, and clean vessel sanitation efforts.

The Farm Bill is the single largest source of conservation funding in the US. There are many programs in the Farm Bill for hunters and anglers and those who encourage the planting of cover crops and compensating farmers for removing environmentally sensitive lands from production, incentivizing public access and wetland protection. In the last five years, \$1 billion in conservation spending each year to improve water quality and habitat, and more than 900,000 acres of private land have been opened for public hunting and fishing from Farm Bill allocations.

The Land and Water Conservation Fund was established by Congress in 1964 to improve and establish new outdoor recreational opportunities on public land. The fund has invested more than \$16 billion in conservation projects over the years. Funding comes from oil and gas royalties, which are divided into pools for grants and appropriations for projects (boat launches, playgrounds, trails, and the acquisition of land, and water resources for public access).

Did You Know . . .

If you shoot a hundred rounds of 9mm on one of our ranges, pick up the brass and put it in one of the green bins, that the money we get from it generates cash at the same or greater rate per volunteer hour than most of our other fundraisers and matches generate. It only takes five minutes or less to pick up your casings, but the money we get for selling/recycling the brass comes with no cost to the club, just a little of your time. If we just sell the brass as scrap, we will generate \$10-12 per hour of volunteer time. .223 brass yields \$15-18 per hour. If we can sell it as reloadable brass, then we can get a good bit more. Our biggest public shooting events yield substantially less per work hour (like 1/4 to 1/2 as much). See why it's important to put your brass in the bins? Take five minutes to pick up your brass and put it in the bins.

There is another benefit to this. If we police our brass the way we should, we'll have a much cleaner set of ranges. It's not only better for the environment (we are a conservation organization after all), but our ranges will look much nicer and more inviting for our guests. This helps shooters want to come back again, and maybe even join TCSL. And we can save volunteer hours at match prep time because the ranges will be in that much better shape to start with.

So please make sure you put your casings in the green bins when you are done shooting. Brass, aluminum, steel—we will sort and recycle it all. Have some old brass at home that you will never use? Bring it in and put it in the bins too! Thanks for your help!

Education Committee

Firearm Education is responsibility that we all must take seriously. Guns will always be in our society, so whether you have zero or ten, it's important for you to understand how to safely handle a gun and to teach that knowledge to others—such as kids, family, and friends.

I became an NRA instructor at my wife's insistence—since I collected firearms, and we had children. The NRA provides many different classes to get you started. We have many extremely experienced and qualified NRA instructors here at TCSL, so if you see a course listed below that you'd like to take, just let me know. It's likely that we'll be able to offer it.

NRA Home Firearm Safety Course is a non-shooting course teaches students the basic knowledge, skills, and to explain the attitude necessary for the safe handling and storage of firearms and ammunition in the home.

NRA Refuse to be a Victim seminars for those of us who want to learn strategies people can integrate into their everyday lives to avoid becoming a victim of crime.

If you are brand new to firearms or have a firearm you've never learned to use or, once a month we offer here at TCSL, "**Know Your Gun.**" (This was originally called "Handgun Cleaning Workshop," but we changed the name because cleaning turned out to be just a small part of what we were helping people with. The bigger part was really just learning more about the firearm.) We only ask that you RSVP and tell us what type of firearm(s) you're planning to bring so that we have the right expert there for you.

Our next Military Rifle Match (a Bench Match) will be held on Saturday, January 19, 2019, and is open to all TCSL members and guests. Registration starts at 9am, and the match begins at 10am. A short safety briefing will be held prior to the match. Fees for the match will be \$10 for members and \$15 for guests. You can compete with any military-style rifle (no full autos), foreign or domestic, modern or vintage, with iron sights or scope. You will need 20 rounds of safe ammunition, safety or shooting glasses, and ear protection. Spotting scopes are helpful. The course of fire for the event shall be: 10 rounds of slow fire from the bench for sight-in within 10 minutes. For score: 10 rounds slow fire from the bench within 10 minutes. For the slow fire, single-fed rounds are fired within 10 minutes.

Please note: You need not be a military member to compete (though they are surely welcome), you only need to own a military style rifle.

First Annual TCSL 185-Yard Open Bench Match

The rifle committee is proud to announce a new 185-Yard Bench Match to be held on the rifle range at 12 noon on Saturday, November 17. This is the first match to utilize our extended range, and it is open to any and all rifles. Scoring will be tracked for two divisions: iron sighted and scoped.

The course of fire will be 10 rounds for sighting, single fed, in 8 minutes, followed by 10 rounds for score, single-fed in 6 minutes. There are two twists to this match. First, a shooter may elect to use the sight-in round for score upon completion and tally, but must declare this prior to beginning the second round. Any shooter who decides to use their score from the first sight-in round will forfeit shooting the second round. Also, the second round for score will be two minutes shorter than the sight-in round.

This is not a Military Match. Any rifles are eligible, so long as they are safe to shoot and can put the rounds down range in the allotted time. Take a break from deer hunting, and bring a rifle and 20 rounds of ammo to the Club. Cost for the match will be \$10 for members, and \$15 for non-members. Shooters who finish in 1st place in their division will win one free pass to a Military Match held in 2019.

Handgun Shoot (Running Deer Shoot) Sundays: November 4 - Shooting Starts at Noon

The Handgun Shoot (aka "Running Deer Shoot") is structured much the same as a good old Turkey Shoot was. Ten individuals buy into a relay, each taking a turn shooting at the "running deer." After each individual shoots their score is totaled and radioed up to the officials table.

The shooter is positioned 25 yards away from a hanging deer silhouette. The silhouette is positioned at the right side of the gallery. Round count and order may change from relay to relay. Our usual starting sequence is 2 shots at the deer while it's standing still and 2 shots while it's deer "running." Once the final standing shoot is fired, the deer will begin to run across the gallery from right to left.

This event is open to the public. This event is open to Handguns, .22 Rifles and PCCs (Pistol Caliber Carbines). Pistols will compete against pistols;.22 Rifles and PPCs will compete among themselves. All type sights or optics are allowed.

This event is FUN and OPEN TO THE PUBLIC, so bring a family member or friend. Cost for each relay is \$5.00.


