President's Column

The last few weeks have been a new experience as the country, state and local entities have responded to the Coronavirus. Everyone has been affected in some way or another, whether it was being exposed to the virus, having children home during school closures, working from home, cancelations of events (e.g., NCAA tournaments, NBA, Masters' tournament, NHL, etc.), cancelation of the NRA Annual Meeting, not being able to find staples or groceries, etc. The daily updates on how to properly care for yourself (e.g., washing hands, not shaking hands, keeping some distance from others, etc.) help remind each of us what to do to help slow the virus as it spreads across the country. Let's remember to thank the law enforcement personnel, fire department staffs, medical professionals and their support staff, emergency individuals who are putting in long hours, being exposed to the virus and continuing to try and keep all of us safe and healthy.

Even before Governor Whitmer's Executive Order, the TCSL Board and Officers voted to cancel many of the TCSL events (e.g., board meetings, membership meetings, broiled steak fry dinners, breakfasts, Saline High School Trap Practices and League, NRA Classes, etc.) through Apriil 1. Pursuant to her order, we will now be closed until April 14. We will re-evaluate the situation in early April to see if events can be rescheduled or additional cancelations are needed. I believe the TCSL Officers and Board members took the socially responsible action; and they were ahead of many leaders, entities, and groups, which doesn't surprise me since TCSL and its members are "good neighbors."

Now what do we do during these unusual times? How about picking up a book you have been meaning to read for a while, but you didn't have the time? In January 2020, Mr. Tom Givens released his new book "Concealed Carry Class: The ABC's of Self-Defense Tools and Tactics." Mr. Givens operates RangeMaster Firearms Training Services, which is a top-notch firearms training outfit and his new book offers some helpful tips. Or how about practicing your dry firing, drawing from your holster, reloading some ammunition?

How did the shooting sports and shooting clubs become popular? Archery and spear target shooting go back centuries for military purposes; however, history reflects the Greeks, Persians, Germans and Celts used target shooting contests to honor gods or as social activities. By the tenth century shooting competition was well established as a social and recreational activity.

In the 13th and 14th century German-speaking individuals formed the first formal shooting clubs. Originally bows and wheel-lock muskets were used. By the 16th century firearms with rifled barrels became popular to use. One shot competitions were common and club competitions were often conducted on holidays with prizes awarded to the best shooters.

The first formal competitions in the United States were in the 1700's and were "turkey shoots" or "rifle frolics" with beef, turkey or other food items the prizes. Most of the competitions were one shot firings at distances of 250 feet – 330 feet from standing or resting positions. Match rifles with 38 to 40-inch barrels, double-set triggers and target sights as were used in Europe became popular between 1790 and 1800. The accuracy of the target guns improved as there were changes in the manufacturing and design of ammunition. An 1880's match in Glendale Park, New York, had more than 600 shooters and 30,000 spectators. Another shooting match at the same location in 1898 had \$25,000 in cash prizes.

Shotgun enthusiasts started shooting at live pigeons around 1825 and the first recorded match was in 1831. Americans were the leaders in developing artificial targets for trap. Originally glass balls containing feathers were used and then clay targets. Adam Bogardus, Ira Paine and "Annie" Oakley were well known trap shooters. "Annie" Oakley once shot 4,772 out of 5,000 glass ball targets released from 15-yard traps, and Bogardus on another day broke 5,681 glass balls in a row before finally missing one.

1860 was the first recorded pistol match. Two men were shooting nine-inch plates china plates from 100 feet. The winner of the match hit 11 out of 15 plates. W.F. "Buffalo Bill" Cody began shooting pistol exhibitions and the pistol shooting sport increased in popularity.

The Lyon, France shooting club started the first World Shooting Championships in 1897. Women's events were added in 1958. The establishment of shooting associations and governing bodies (e.g., International Shooting Union, Amateur Trap Shooting Association, Pacific International Trap Association, NRA International Shooting Sports, National Skeetshooting Association, U.S. Shooting Team, etc.) all helped with the expansion of the shooting sports and shooting clubs.

So, when you are shooting at TCSL or competing at TCSL keep in mind that TCSL exists due to formal target shooting dating back to the time of Homer's Iliad.

Stay healthy, and once the club re-opens, come out to the TCSL Ranges to keep your shooting skills sharp. In the meantime, check on TCSL members struggling with health issues or lack of a strong support system. Picking up a member's medications, groceries, etc. may help a home-bound member.

Shooting starts at 12:00 noon, and the cost for each relay (25 pins = 5 pins x 5 tables) is \$5.00. (\$5.00 range fee applies for non-members.)

Pin-shooting is a fun, but challenging, event. We welcome the skilled shooter, as well as the novice shooter to participate. We guarantee you will enjoy yourself, while enhancing your shooting skills. Members are encouraged to bring friends/family along with them. Non-members are welcome.

The shooter stands 25 feet away from a structure, with 5 bowling pins on it. A safety officer with a timer will give the command to commence firing, at which time the shooter will begin shooting until all 5 pins are knocked down. The time it takes to knock 5 pins down is recorded. The average time of the shooters best 4 tables will determine his/her score. Bragging rights are determined by the lowest shooter's score (time).

In the 4x4 Steel Plate Challenge, shooters will get two chances to knock down 4 steel plates, using only 4 rounds of ammo in their handgun. Speed and accuracy will determine the winner. Shooter with the fastest time of the day wins a cash prize. The cost to try the 4x4. Price for the Challenge is \$4.00.


