Hunters' Ed

April 1 marks the end of small game hunting and the approach of wild turkey season (April 23-June 7), so it's time to sight-in and pattern your turkey shotgun to be sure that you'll get a clean kill on that long beard.

Youth hunters 17 and younger can get a free patch from http://www.minwtf.org/patch-program-2022 a valid hunting license. Be sure to check the Michigan Spring Turkey Digest for hunt units, season dates, bag limits and all the rest.

In order to purchase a hunting license in Michigan, an individual born on or after January 1, 1960, is required to successfully complete an approved hunter education course. Take the online class at https://www.hunter-ed.com/michigan, and sign up for a field day. The next TCSL field day will be held on May 21. That information is available at https://michigan.storefront.kalkomey.com/em/programs.

And while you're hunting those wild turkeys, it's a good time to look for morel mushrooms and deer antler sheds.

March Madness Rifle Match


On Saturday, March 19th, we held our first ever March Madness Match at the 100 yd rifle range with 9 shooters. What the heck is it? It is a 100 yd bench match using 22 LR rifles. Any scoped or iron-sighted 22LR rifle can be used. Each course for the match consisted of trying to break 10 clay birds at 100 yds using a maximum of 20 rounds of ammo. Each course was a maximum of 90 seconds long. Rifles were loaded with 5 rounds at a time maximum, and only one magazine could be used. The timer starts with the magazines empty, and rifle, magazines, and ammo in 5 round cups on the bench.

So what makes it a 'March Madness' match? Once all the shooters have signed in, we randomly drew numbers, which determined each shooter's place in a bracket system (seeding), just like the NCAA basketball tournament. Shooters then went through each course two at a time. The first shooter to break all the birds first, or break the most at the end of 90 seconds, moved on to the next round. The other shooter was done for the match. We progressed through as many firing courses as necessary until we had a winner.

No one was able to break all 10 birds during a round - it was harder to do than you'd think. Good thing it wasn't too cold; loading those .22 shells under time pressure was frustrating, and we all fumbled a bit. The score bracket is shown below, with each shooter's score for the round shown to the right of their name. And don't assume that a low score means they didn't hit birds – only fully broken or birds with holes larger than a quarter counted as broken.

All shooters enjoyed the match, so we will be doing it again in the future. Keep your eye out on the calendar for it.

On the Rifle Ranges . . .

If you have been by the rifle ranges lately, you may have noticed that the 25-yard target stand has been removed. Due to damage from many errant shots, it needed a break. The target stand was falling apart, there were a lot of skips well in front of the berm, and heavy damage to the posts holding up the overhead brow (as well on the overhead boards). It is every member's responsibility to make sure each bullet you fire is hitting the berm. Please remember that, and think about where you are aiming as you pull the trigger each time.

Along with the damage, we're seeing an increase in the amount of shells left laying around and targets left on or around the stands. Please try to keep the range clean—put away rests and carpets, pick up your casings, and clear away your targets and put them in the trash before you leave.
