President's Column

It's that time of the year when Mother Nature says "I will give you a visual symphony" to help you not remember that soon the dreary days will be upon us once again. And as we close the wonderful green, warm, growing season, the trees all around us have ignited with color. The display on our property is impressive. But it is short lived. A mere three days ago several trees near the lower level entrance were in peak color. This morning, a large percentage of those colors were on the ground. Enjoy it while we can.

Autumn requires that we do many things to prepare for the winter, whether it's at home or at the Club. The annual **Fall Clean-Up Day** is scheduled for Saturday, November 5, starting at 8am. All hands are welcome! Earn **double work hours** for your efforts. We will first focus on the ranges in order to complete them before normal opening at 10am. The rest of the property will follow. Bring your work duds, gloves, tools, rakes, tarps, pickup trucks, trailers, and enthusiasm to prepare the property for winter. If you want to go from start to finish, you are welcome. If you can only put in a few hours that is most welcome as well. Did I mention that you earn **double work hours**?

Falling temperatures and winter winds make for less fun on an outdoor range. Join us on Sunday, November 13, at 9am to put up the **plastic on the pistol house**. Bring your drill motors, screw bits, ladders, saws, and good ideas to help us winterize the pistol house. We will have the plastic, the furring strips, 2 x 4s, and screws to seal the deal. We won't promise you any heat in the pistol house, but at least we can help block the wind. We may even wrap the grill pit after we finish the pistol house.

Firearm season opens on November 15. Observing good firearm practices are as important in the field as on the range or elsewhere. The NRA big three safety rules are: Direction, Finger, Unloaded. Always keep the gun pointed in a safe direction. Always keep your finger off the trigger until ready to shoot. Always keep the gun unloaded until ready to use. The NRA also has the little eight safety rules: Know your target and what is beyond it. Know how to use the gun safely. Be sure the gun is safe to operate. Use only the correct ammo for each gun. Wear eye and ear protection. Never use alcohol or drugs (over-the-counter, prescription, or recreational) before or while shooting. Store guns so that they are not accessible to unauthorized persons. Be aware that each firearm may

have additional safety precautions. If you are heading out for the hunt, may you be safe and successful.

We will be having rifle sight-in times prior to opening day. The tentative plans are for sight-ins between Tuesday, November 8, and Tuesday, November 15. Normal sign-in and range fees apply to members. The public can participate for \$20 per hour. Bore sighting will be available for \$10 per firearm on November 12, 13, 14. RSOs are needed to monitor the ranges; see your email and the website to sign up for shifts. Check the [TCSL calendar](http://tcsl.org) for an updated listing of dates and times. We are a volunteer organization.

Our search for a new clubhouse/facility manager was successful. The Board has confirmed the appointment of Mr. Tim Grapentien to that position. Tim is a Club member and brings a large degree of knowledge and experience in both firearms and archery. Please stop in and welcome Tim to his new post.

Several members contributed to the creation and the improvement of the job posting and the details of the position. Thanks goes out to Steve Reed, Val Kabat, Maudie Abraham, John Harden, Fred Girbach, Mark Smokowicz, Carlos Soto, and Charlie Unbehaun for their timely input. The interview committee was Mark, Val, and myself. We conducted three interviews and thank the other two candidates for their interest and participation.

The tractor was out for clutch repair for a while and is now repaired and back. Thanks to Carlos Soto and Rick Parsons for transportation to and from the shop. Several members, including Bill Arcy and Phil Cardon (tractor geeks), helped to evaluate the tractor and determined that the issue was beyond our ability.

The clubhouse will be the polling place for York Township on Tuesday, November 8. If you come into the clubhouse, be mindful of the election proceedings in progress.

Military Rifle Match Held

Our fourth standard Military Rifle Match for 2022 was held on Saturday, October 15, at the 100-yard rifle range with 5 shooters.

Our next Military Rifle Match will be held in spring 2023 and will be open to all TCSL members and guests. Registration starts at 9am, and the match begins at 10am. A short safety briefing will be held prior to the match. Fees for the match will be \$10 for members and \$15 for guests. You can compete with any military style rifle (no full autos), foreign or domestic, modern or vintage, with iron sights or scope. You will need 45 rounds of safe ammunition, a shooting mat or something to lie on, safety or shooting glasses, and ear protection. Spotting scopes and sling are helpful.

The course of fire for the event shall be: (5) rounds of slow fire in the prone position for sight-in within 5 minutes. For score; (10) rounds slow fire in the prone position, (10) rounds of rapid fire in the prone position, (10) rounds rapid fire in the sitting position, and (10) rounds of slow fire in the standing unsupported position. For the slow fire portion, single-fed rounds are fired within 8 minutes, while rapid fire is within 80 seconds with a magazine or stripper clip change. **Please note: You need not be a military member to compete, though they are surely welcome; you only need to own a military-style rifle.** For further information or questions contact Dave Vandermark at rifle@TCSL.org.

Trench Match Held

On October 1, TCSL hosted its fourth Trench Match. Its purpose was to simulate shooting positions you might find yourself in defending your trench in World War I. It took place on the 100-yard rifle range, and was a 50-shot match, with 3 rounds:

Round 1 – Standing Position. 20 shots from a standing position, supported at 100 yards. Required 4 loading cycles that could vary in number of shots each (5-5-5-5, or 8-2-5-5, or 2-10-5-3, etc.). Timer starts with the rifle unloaded. Time limit: 100 seconds.

Round 2 – Kneeling position. 10 shots kneeling, supported at 100 yards. Required 2 loading cycles. Timer starts with the rifle unloaded. Time limit: 60 seconds.

Round 3 – Prone Position. This round was time limited to 100 seconds, and allowed the shooter up to 20 shots to break 10 clay birds that were hung at 100 yards. Firing was in the prone position, supported using a rest provided. Required 4 loading cycles that could vary in number of shots each (5-5-5-5, or 8-2-5-5, or 2-10-5-3, etc.). Timer starts with the rifle unloaded. Points awarded based on the number of clays broken (5 per bird), with a 10-point bonus if all 10 are broken.

So, why is this called a trench match? The rests provided in rounds 1 and 2 are small ports in a mock trench wall, and the prone rest simulates an earthen berm. They are meant to not be comfortable positions. And to add to the difficulty, the rifle must have a bayonet attached during all firing.

Range Safety

Some of the most common problems found at the range:

1. Not signing in correctly or paying fees
You need to sign in the book prior to going to the range. Range fees are \$5 for members and \$8 for guests. Children under 12 are free.
2. Not having membership/guest ID displayed
Bring you ID to the range with you and have it visible.
3. Guns aimed above the horizontal
No blue sky. Our neighbors appreciate it
4. Skips, Hit the Backstop!
Especially in the pistol house, line up your finger gun at the target to ensure you will hit the backstop. Target placement is important!
5. Lack of proper Supervision of guest or minors
Members are allowed 3 guests maximum. And you need to be with them at all times. You are responsible for your guests to follow all club rules.



Hunters Ed.

Falls from trees are more common than accidental shootings, and injuries often are severe.

Hunters are two to three times more likely to be injured by a fall from a tree stand than from a firearm. Injuries often happen when hunters are climbing up or down from the tree stand, resulting in serious leg fractures and spinal cord injuries.

While the main rifle deer hunting season won't begin until November 15, several other hunts, including archery hunting, are underway. In studies of hunting-related injuries, research shows that injuries are often caused by hunters not using safety harnesses.

Hunter safety laws and an increased emphasis on firearm safety have contributed to a notable drop in firearm injuries and deaths over the last several decades. Tree stand safety should be treated with the same respect as firearm safety.

Precautions hunters should be aware of to avoid accidental falls:

Always wear a high-quality, full-body tree harness.

Keep your stand at a reasonable height of 10 to 15 feet.

Make sure your tree stand is securely attached to the tree and the tree is healthy.

Clear the area beneath your stand of rocks and branches.

Do an equipment safety check before and after every outing, replacing any broken straps or parts.

Avoid alcohol and other drugs before and during your hunt.

Carry a cell phone and a whistle for emergency signaling.

Clip into your safety line or linemen's belt every time you leave the ground.

Research proper safety procedures for climbing up and down from the tree and how to recover if a fall should occur.

A short safety briefing will be held prior to the match. Fees for the match will be \$10 for members and \$15 for guests. You can compete with **ANY** rifle (no full autos), foreign or domestic, modern or vintage, with iron sights or scope, as long as you can fire the 10 rounds in 10 minutes. You will need 20 rounds of safe ammunition, safety or shooting glasses, and ear protection. Spotting scopes are helpful.

The course of fire for the event shall be: (10) rounds of slow fire from the bench for sight-in within 10 minutes. For score: (10) rounds slow fire from the bench within 8 minutes. Shooters may elect to use their score from the sight-in stage, but in doing so would forfeit shooting the 2nd round.

Handgun/Running Deer Shoot

Sunday, November 6 - Cost for each relay is \$5.00.

The "HANDGUN SHOOT" (Running Deer Shoot) is structured much the same as a good, old Turkey Ten individuals buy into a relay, and all ten take turns shooting at the running deer. After each individual shoots, their score is totaled and radioed up to the officials' table. The highest score of the relay wins a prize.

The shooter is positioned 25 yards away from a hanging deer silhouette, which is positioned at the right side of the gallery. Round count and order may change from relay to relay. Our usual starting sequence is 2 shots at the deer standing still and 2 shots while the deer is running. Once the final standing shoot is fired, the deer will begin to run across the gallery from right to left.

Firearms allowed: Handguns, .22 Rifles and PPCs (Pistol Caliber Carbines). Pistols will compete against pistols; .22 Rifles and PPCs will compete among themselves. All type of sights or optics are allowed.

This event is open to the public, and shooting starts at 12 noon. **It's FUN!** Bring a family member or a friend.
