Spring clean-up was on April 29. Much of the day's activity was cleaning up this winter's ice and snowstorm damage and debris. In the grassy areas, it was endless gathering and raking of branches of all sizes for transport to the burn pile. Near the Action Bays the chainsaw was busy clearing out the damaged trees. There was a steady operation of dragging wood, limbs, branches, and tress to the burn pit. The grassy areas are now prepared for mowing without damaging the equipment. The area near the Action Bays now looks pretty naked, and we are chatting about how we may find a use for that area and how to restore the sight break that all that overgrowth provided. Thanks to all for your hard work of getting the grounds ready for summer chores. And thanks to Pete S. for organizing the day.



We have had some interesting items on the administrative front recently. The Board voted to repair the walk-in cooler near the bar. Although that unit has been broken for several years, Covid reduced our refrigeration needs. The new cooler in the kitchen was sufficient; but the bookings are improving, and our needs are increasing. Once repaired, it will serve as a backup as well. If the kitchen cooler were to head south, we would be in a real pickle without a backup. We added an insurance line for employment practices. The insurance company required a few submittals. One was an employee handbook, which we did not have as a stand-alone document. We consolidated items from other policies and searched templates as to what we may want to include in a handbook. Thanks to all who reviewed the drafts. Although we've always been required to paying for beer and wine only by check or cash, the State imposed a new electronic payment requirement. Between the time we started and finished the registration process, one of our vendors changed the payment company they worked with. Upon completion of the process we received a DENIED message. We thought that maybe we couldn't order that beer anymore, but a phone call explained that it was their unexpected change of payment companies that resulted in the denied status. Crisis avoided!

During a conversation with a past president recently, he related a discussion with a "governmental type" who inquired as to how we as a Club performed all necessary duties with only one paid employee. The concern was that we were paying others under the table. It was when we were able to demonstrate the extent of our volunteer effort that the concern was laid to rest. So you see, our volunteerism does more than just keep the Club alive and functioning.

The NRA three fundamental rules for gun safety are (1) always keep the gun pointed in a safe direction, (2) keep your finger off the trigger until ready to shoot, and (3) keep the gun unloaded until ready to use. At our Club orientation we stress hitting the backstop. The fundamental rules, muzzle control, target placement, and cardboard backing placement help us all to adhere to that critical goal of safety on the range. Always be mindful of whether the range you are on is hot or cold, and comply with all Club rules adopted to promote safety.

Flag Day is June 14, and Father's Day is June 18. Here's to safety, liberty, and fathers!

Military Rifle Match Held

Our first standard Military Rifle Match for 2023 was held on Saturday, May 20, at the 100-yard rifle range with four shooters.

Our next Military Rifle Match will be held on August 12 and is open to all TCSL members and guests. Registration starts at 9am, and the match begins at 10am. A short safety briefing will be held prior to the match. Fees for the match will be \$10 for members and \$15 for guests. You can compete with any military style rifle (no full autos), foreign or domestic, modern or vintage, with iron sights or scope. You will need 45 rounds of safe ammunition, a shooting mat or something to lie on, safety or shooting glasses and ear protection. Spotting scopes and sling are helpful.

The course of fire for the event shall be: (5) rounds of slow fire in the prone position for sight-in within five minutes. For score, (10) rounds slow fire in the prone position, (10) rounds of rapid fire in the prone position, (10) rounds rapid fire in the sitting position and (10) rounds of slow fire in the standing un-supported position. For the Slow fire portion, single-fed rounds are fired within 8 minutes, while rapid fire is within 80 seconds with a magazine or stripper clip change. There will be a short safety briefing prior to the match. Please Note: You need not be a military member to compete, as they are surely welcome, you only need to own a military style rifle. 


Rifle Matches Coming in June Please note that the Cavalry Match has been moved to June 17!

We are trying a new match series this summer and calling it the 22LR 100yd IBS Match. It is a 30-round match that is shot all at once, consisting of six (5) round targets, one for sight-in and 5 for score. Competitors will have 20 minutes to complete the match, then targets will be retrieved and scored. Any 22LR rifle is allowed, but know that the targets are about 4" in diameter, so your gun needs to be sighted-in well. Scopes of at least 6x power are recommended, as are shooting rests and spotting scopes. Rear bags will be allowed, but no one-piece sleds.

We will shoot this match series on Thursday evenings, once a month in June, July, August, and September, to try to make them available to those who can't come out on Saturday mornings. Cost will be \$10 for members, \$15 for guests. See the TCSL calendar for dates and start times.




TARGET ALIGNMENT A TOP PRIORITY!

At Tri-County target placement and sight alignment are very important to the overall safety of our ranges. Knowing your target and what is behind it is one of the fundamentals of safe shooting.


In the Pistol House we strive to place the carboard target backers at the correct standing positions for average shooters, however people come in all sizes.




Many people enjoy shooting while seated or sighting in their pistols using a bench rest. This requires the cardboard and target to be placed at a lower position to properly impact the berm.



It is very import to remember to lower the carboard and target to ensure proper target alignment, failing to do so can result in damage to the building or missing the berm entirely.



We ask that if you lower the carboard for sitting you replace it to the original higher position when you have completed shooting. Shooters have been observed negligently shooting at low carboard from a standing position. Remember you must always check your target alignment to prevent skips, this is especial important in the winter when the ground may be frozen.



Bowling Pin Shoots - Open to The Public

Bowling pin shooting is a fun, but challenging event. We welcome the skilled shooter, as well as, the novice shooter to participate. We guarantee you will enjoy yourself, while enhancing your shooting skills. Members and Non-members are encouraged to bring friends/family along with them.

PCC & .22 Rifle Bowling Pin Shoot Sundays: June 11, July 30, August 20, September 24 11:30am until 4:00pm Shooting starts at 12:00 noon. The cost for each relay (20 pins = 5 pins x 4 tables) is \$5.00.

The shooter stands **20 yards** away from a structure, with 5 bowling pins on it. A safety officer, with a timer, will give the command to commence firing, at which time the shooter will begin shooting until all 6 pins are knocked down. The time it takes to knock 5 pins down is recorded. The average time of the shooters best 3 tables will determine his/her score. Bragging rights are determined by the lowest shooter's score.

If you don't own a PCC or .22 rifle and would like to participate, there are several members on site who are willing to loan you their .22 rifle for this event.

Handgun Bowling Pin Shoot Sundays: June 4, July 9, August 13, September 17 11:30am until 4:00pm

Shooting starts at 12:00 noon.
The cost for each relay (20 pins = 5 pins x 4 tables) is \$5.00.

The shooter stands **25 feet** away from a structure, with 5 bowling pins on it. A safety officer with a timer will give the command to commence firing, at which time the shooter will begin shooting until all 5 pins are knocked down. The time it takes to knock 5 pins down is recorded. The average time of the shooters best 3 tables will determine his/her score. Bragging rights are determined by the lowest shooter's score (time).

If you don't own a handgun, PCC or .22 rifle and would like to participate, there are several members on site who are willing to loan you their .22 handgun or rifle for this event.

Trench Match Held

On May 6, TCSL hosted its fifth Trench Match. Its purpose was to simulate shooting positions you might find yourself in defending your trench in World War I. It took place on the 100-yard rifle range, and was a 50-shot match, with 3 rounds:

Round 1 – Standing Position. 20 shots from a standing position, supported at 100 yards. Required 4 loading cycles that could vary in number of shots each (5-5-5-5, or 8-2-5-5, or 2-10-5-3, etc.). Timer starts with the rifle unloaded. Time limit: 90 seconds.

Round 2 – Kneeling position. 10 shots kneeling, supported at 100 yards. Required 2 loading cycles. Timer starts with the rifle unloaded. Time limit: 60 seconds.

Round 3 – Prone Position. This round was time limited to 100 seconds, and allowed the shooter up to 20 shots to break 10 clay birds that were hung at 100 yards. Firing was in the prone position, supported using a rest provided. Required 4 loading cycles that could vary in number of shots each (5-5-5-5, or 8-2-5-5, or 2-10-5-3, etc.). Timer starts with the rifle unloaded. Points awarded based on the number of clays broken (5 per bird), with a 10 point bonus if all 10 are broken.

So, why is this called a trench match? The rests provided in rounds 1 and 2 are small ports in a mock trench wall, and the prone rest simulates an earthen berm. They are meant to be uncomfortable positions. And to add to the difficulty, the rifle must have a bayonet attached during all firing.

Now there's one more place to find those regulations. Go to your app store, and get Michigan DNR Hunt Fish on your phone.

Knowing the rules and regulations is your responsibility and following them is the ethical thing to do.

Turkey hunting ends June 7, but don't take my word for it. You know where to find out! I hope you had a good season and bagged that Big Old Tom.

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
