President's Column

In July we held the annual Kids on the Range Day event. From a weather standpoint, we can compare KORD with June's Women on Target by borrowing a theme from Dickens: KORD was the wettest of events and WOT was the driest of events. The KORD concerns centered on keeping everyone dry with an ever-vigilant eye on the sky and radar for severe weather and assuring everyone was sheltered—and mud, mud, and more mud. WOT kept that evervigilant eye out for a grass fire. While it rained much of time, the weather gods shined on us by keeping severe weather away and not requiring an interruption of the events and evacuation of the ranges to shelter. And of course, about the time the teams were completing their final rotations, the clouds went away and good ol' Sol came out to bathe us in heat and humidity.

There were no doubts and concerns regarding the coordination beyond the weather. The months of planning by Val, the coaches, and the teams produced another fine event. Each part of the whole was staffed by our volunteers. Wrist bands were issued to confirm registration and attendance at the safety briefing. The ranges were prepared. Refreshments were delivered to the ranges. Guides steered the teams from station to station. Cookies were baked. Melon was cut and chilled. Pizza was ordered and delivered. Ice water was available. The coaches-from Archery, to Shotgun, to Rifle, to Pistol, to High Caliber, to Pinshoot-provided their oversight and skill to the participants. A demonstration of a well-planned and executed event is that everything goes according to schedule and any snags are not apparent to anyone except to the snag monitors. We met that standard. Thank you to Val, the coaches, and all the volunteers. This is just one more example of the skill and commitment of our members.

The mud we encountered was mainly due to the arrival of a great amount of soil on the grounds just days earlier. We were able to arrange with a local company conducting earth moving on the US-23 project to deliver, stage, and mold improvements to our backstops and berms. The Turkey Bays were increased in height by a few feet. The berm to the right side of the Rifle Houses was elongated to now provide a complete sight break between Rifle and the Pistol House. The left side of the Pistol House berm was improved. And a berm was added to the Trap Range to help protect the creek. The Trap berm is some 16 plus feet in elevation and some 300 plus feet in length. The existing berms at the Pistol Ranges were reconditioned, to counteract never-ending gravity. Planning continues to use these improvements to better utilize our grounds and ranges. The possibility of receiving soil began in mid-winter. Two companies contacted us to determine if we needed dirt. The benefit on their end was that they saved costs related to wages and fuel to deliver soil to us in their back yard, so to speak. Each company offered delivery, machinery, skilled operators, and time in exchange for a closer repositioning of the soil. On our end, we answered several question relating to zoning with the township and county. Each range was evaluated to determine how we may be able to employ more dirt. The Board approved contractual language that included that once the dirt was delivered and positioned, they (the company) would not move it again or take possession again. The start time finally arrived, and the company and Tim G. sprang into action. Within a few short days they had completed the project. Our spearhead was Tim G. Other notables were Phil C., Pam and Don H., Mike C., Mark B., Steve J, Dave V. Thanks to all who worked on this (if I missed specific mention). As we move forward, the watchword is "patience." We need to ensure that these ranges are opened with compliance and safety as the highest considerations.

Moving into August we all know the drill. The calendar is accessed at <u>https://tcsl.org/#calendar</u>. Regular events include education meetings and classes, a hunter education field day, pin shoots with handguns and PCC and .22 rifles, rifle matches, Wednesday Range Time, IDPA Saturday match. The Steak Fry is on August 25, and help is always needed. The Board meeting is August 17; no membership meeting in August. We hope to see you at the Club.

Early in September IDPA is holding their 3-day Challenge Match. Ranges will be closed as they are prepared for the competition. Check the calendar and email blasts to plan your range time to avoid disappointment.

Remember we are members and owners of the Club. Let's take pride in it. We are also caretakers of the Club. Many preceded us to form and operate the Club. We need to conduct today's activities to ensure that it's here for tomorrow. Skill development, safety, and community are a few of the goals we should aspire to.

Hunter Education

If you or someone you know is planning to hunt this year or even if you are just thinking you might be interested in hunting.

To purchase a hunting license in Michigan, an individual born on or after January 1, 1960, is required to successfully complete an approved hunter education course.

There are three options for completing hunter education in Michigan:

- 1.A traditional classroom-based course + in-person field day (typically included as part of the classroom course)
- 2. An online course + in-person field day.
- 3. A take home study course + in-person field day.

At TCSL we offer the online course + in-person field day. We have an event coming up on August 12 from 8:00am to 5:10pm.

About this Event:

Registration opens on July 15. On event day, bring a copy of online certificate/field-day voucher, eye and ear protection for shooting, drink, and lunch for the half-hour break. Ours is an outdoor range, so dress for the weather. Class fee is \$8.00 (cash preferred). Do not bring guns or ammunition, they will be provided. Class starts promptly at 8am. Be early to sign in and get seated. A 50-question test will be given at the end of the day, so be prepared. We encourage parents or hunting partners to come and sit in on the class at no charge. You can't help in the test or shoot, but you might have fun; and it's a good refresher. Guests should bring the same essentials as participants (less certificate and cash).

Practicing good gun range etiquette isn't just good manners—it's good sense! Gun range etiquette is a blend of common sense, courtesy, and safety. A day at the range is fun, and good gun range etiquette makes it even better.

Most clubs and ranges require shooters to attend a safety class prior to using the range. This certifies that you've read and understand the **NRA Basic Rules of Gun Safety** and the specific rules that apply at the range you're using. Remember that there may be other gun safety rules that are enforced on your range, but these three rules are ALWAYS appropriate, no matter where you are:

- 1. ALWAYS keep the gun pointed in a safe direction.
- 2. ALWAYS keep your finger off the trigger until ready to shoot.
- 3. ALWAYS keep the gun unloaded until ready to use.

Most ranges have **Range Safety Officers** (**RSOs**, also known as Range Masters) whose job is to supervise shooters, to enforce the rules and regulations of their ranges, and to handle any problems that may occur. Pay attention to the RSOs, who will tell you what to do in case of an emergency. Remember that the Range Safety Officer has absolute authority on the range. **Compliance with his or her instructions is mandatory**.

When you arrive at a range, introduce yourself to the RSO and let him/her know if this is your first visit to the range. The RSO will tell you what you need to know before you set up your gear.

Know the basic **range commands**, and learn other commands that are used at your range. If you don't understand what they mean, ask the Range Safety Officer. He or she will be happy to explain it to you. Remember that asking questions is a sign of intelligence and maturity.

Two of the most common range commands are **Ceasefire** and **Commence Firing**, although sometimes it is said differently. Instead of "ceasefire," some ranges are using the words, "Stop shooting!" and instead of "Commence Firing," some are using the phrase, "You may begin shooting." This is because we want our instructions to be as clear and as easy to understand as possible.

Ceasefires are used whenever all shooting must stop, whether it is because time's up or because a potential problem has arisen. Whenever the RSO's attention must be away from the firing line, he or she will call a ceasefire. Whenever someone needs to go downrange for any reason, a ceasefire is called. Ceasefires are also called when it's time to post, change or retrieve targets.

However, the RSO is not the only person who can call a ceasefire. Anyone who spots a potential problem should call "Ceasefire!" The RSO will repeat the words and see to it that all firing stops immediately. If you aren't sure what's happening, it's okay to call a ceasefire. It's better to call a ceasefire and be safe than not to call one and be sorry.

Ceasefires are used in all kinds of situations—not just when it's time to change, post, or retrieve targets. Perhaps a person has inadvertently wandered out onto the firing range, or perhaps a shooter in the point next to you has become ill. It's your duty to call a ceasefire so that the RSO can take control of the situation and provide a solution or direct others to provide assistance if necessary.

During a ceasefire, there should be no handling of firearms. The key things to remember are:

- 1. Chamber is empty and ammunition source (magazine) is removed
- 2. Action is open.
- 3. Hands off!4. Step away from the firing line.

Before anyone goes downrange, the RSO will do a visual check to see that everyone has stepped away from the firing line, and then ask, "Is everyone clear?" Everyone else on the line should also make this visual check, because safety is everyone's responsibility.

Clear means that all shooters have made their firearms safe, that no one has a gun in his/her hand, and that there will be no handling of firearms until permission is given. **Then, and ONLY then, may anyone go downrange**.

When the ceasefire is over, the RSO will ensure that no one is downrange before stating, "The range is going hot." This alerts everyone that the range is shifting from a ceasefire, but it doesn't mean that shooting may begin. You must wait until the "commence firing" command has been given before you can shoot.

Commence Firing is the command given that tells everyone it's safe to shoot. That doesn't mean you start blazing away. It means that when you are ready, you may shoot your gun. These are two of the sweetest words a shooter will hear.

Remember, **safety is everyone's job**. You are responsible for your own safety, the safety of others and for the behavior of your guests. If you see that someone else isn't following the rules, you should leave the range. Go to a safe place and report the situationas soon as possible to the authorities.

A few other rules of Good Gun Range Etiquette are:

1.Do not fire at posts, supports or target frames. These are expensive and time-consuming to replace.

2. Shoot only range-approved targets. Check with your range to find out what types of targets are allowed. Some ranges allow only approved paper, cardboard, club-furnished metal targets and clay targets.

3. If you set out target frames to support your targets before you started shooting, you will need to return them to the storage area once you are done.

4. If your club or range allows pets, keep them on leashes or under control at all times. Give careful consideration to bringing a pet to a shooting range. Remember that shooting may hurt your pet's hearing the same way it may hurt yours. Pets that scavenge (eat things that may or may not be food) should not come to a shooting range with you. Be aware that pets unused to gunfire might panic on a range.

5. It's good etiquette to leave the range better than you found it. Picking up trash, cleaning your firing station, and obeying all of the range rules are not only good gun range etiquette—they're good manners!
