President's Column

Among them are hall set-up and tear-down, food preparation, servers, bartenders, bussing tables, and kitchen clean-up. BIG NEWS: In September, the Board voted to allow lead shot to be used on the Trap Range again! This re-opens Trap to full availability. Nick Coburn has agreed to step into the position of Trap Chair. Nick began shooting trap at TCSL when he was a child. The wider trap community is ready to help Nick and the Club resume operation of the range. Please help Nick and Trap in this effort. Check the calendar for new dates of Trap operation.

A little history of how we arrived at this point may be in order. Club documents point to the current trap location beginning operation in the 1960s. At that time, lead shot falling into the Koch Warner Drain was not a big deal. Fast forward to current environmental concerns, the Club entered into an Environmental Stewardship Plan agreement with MUCC (Michigan United Conservation Clubs). One of the main goals of the Plan is to avoid shooting lead into waters and streams. The Club built a wooden cover over the creek to prevent lead from entering the waterway. In March 2020 the Board voted to close Trap due to possible breaches in the creek cover. In July of this year, an earthen berm was created to protect the creek. Several trap rounds were conducted to test the effectiveness of the new berm. This was done at the location where lead is most likely to fall into the creek. The test demonstrated no lead falling onto the collection tarp, therefore the berm was effective. The test was designed to be reproducible for subsequent tests, as required by the Plan.

Specifics of the berm will follow in a future newsletter. Recognition goes to many. First and foremost:Thanks to Tim Grapentien, who was the spark and fuel for the project. Tim literally lived at the Club in his camper for a few days. This would not have happened without him. Those putting in many hours include Phil C., Mike C., Pam and Don H., Pete S., Mark B., Steve J., Steve R., Dave V. The effort spanned from reviewing ballistic tables and calculating trajectories and fallouts to sweaty hours in the July sun, which produced some colorful language as the site was prepared. Thank you all for allowing Trap to return!



We have had several transitions lately. Maudie Abraham resigned from the Board. Maudie was a valuable voice and welcomed new members who were in attendance at the meetings. Thank you, Maudie, for your service. Tim Grapentien was appointed to fill her vacant Region 1 seat. This allows Tim to provide input and guidance as Club Manager at Board meetings without suspending the rules. Welcome, Tim. Mark Burkhardt has been opening the clubhouse and serving as RSO on Mondays for nine (NINE!) years and has decided to step away from that duty. Thank you, Mark.

This presents an opportunity for someone to take over that Monday slot. Being reliably available is the main requirement. To open the bar, a <u>State of Michigan TAM certificate</u> is required. <u>Training can be completed online</u>, and the Club will pick up the cost. Who Remembers Dennis Osborn?

We found out recently that Dennis Osborn, a long-time member of the Club, passed away in Kalkaska in late July. Dennis joined the Club in early 1993 and was a life member. He left the Club in late 2017. He was our Chief Range Safety Officer for most of that time.

The following is my recollection of my time getting to know Dennis:

He was at the clubhouse every day of the week. He would sit at the bar with the TV tuned to some cop show or many other channels. When there was someone on the ranges, he would head down to check them out. From late 2013 until his departure, I would help manage the clubhouse on many Sundays and an occasional Tuesday. Tuesdays were very slow. He and I would sit at the bar, him reading a book and me doing some work for my consulting business. Occasionally I would bring a copy of "Air and Space Magazine" which he would read from cover to cover during the day.

He was a difficult person to interact with. Everyone who was around back then has a "Dennis story." He had a rough exterior, but he was a very knowledgeable man. He was a voracious reader and extremely knowledgeable about firearms. After a couple of months, we started to get to know one another. I think it was when somehow he mentioned that he had been an MP at Aberdeen Proving Grounds in Maryland, and I mentioned that I had done a remote sensing project there that he started to open up to me. During our overlapping time, I became interested in 22lr target shooting, which was one of his passions. He taught me how to sit at the bench and hold the rifle. He coached me at least five or six times. On one occasion, he asked if I minded if he shot as well, which I did not. He retrieved a 22Ir rifle from his car. Instead of setting up a target, he took out a knife and cut a slit in the top of the cardboard target backer and placed a playing card edge on to the line of fire. He split the card in half on the third shot!

Our next 185 Yard Bench Match will be held in 2024, and will be open to all TCSL members and guests. Registration starts at 9am and the match begins at **10am**. A short safety briefing will be held prior to the match. Fees for the match will be \$10 for members and \$15 for guests. You can compete with **ANY** rifle (no full autos), foreign or domestic, modern, or vintage, with iron sights or scope, as long as you can fire the 10 rounds in 10 minutes. You will need 20 rounds of safe ammunition, safety or shooting glasses, and ear protection. Spotting scopes are helpful.

The course of fire for the event shall be: (10) rounds of slow fire from the bench for sight-in within 10 minutes. For score; (10) rounds slow fire from the bench within 8 minutes. Shooters may elect to use their score from the sight-in stage, but in doing so would forfeit shooting the 2nd round.




Friends of NRA Banquet







Target Alignment: A Top Priority!

At Tri-County target placement and sight alignment are very important to the overall safety of our ranges. Knowing your target and what is behind it is one of the fundamentals of safe shooting.


In the Pistol House we strive to place the carboard target backers at the correct standing positions for average shooters, however people come in all sizes.




Many people enjoy shooting while seated or sighting in their pistols using a bench rest. This requires the cardboard and target to be placed at a lower position to properly impact the berm.



It is very import to remember to lower the carboard and target to ensure proper target alignment, failing to do so can result in damage to the building or missing the berm entirely.



We ask that if you lower the carboard for sitting you replace it to the original higher position when you have completed shooting. Shooters have been observed negligently shooting at low carboard from a standing position. Remember you must always check your target alignment to prevent skips, this is especial important in the winter when the ground may be frozen.



Handgun/Running Deer Shoot Sundays, October 8, 15, 29 & November 5 Cost for each relay: \$5.00

The "HANDGUN SHOOT" (Running Deer Shoot) is structured much the same as a good, old Turkey Shoot. Ten individuals buy into a relay, and all ten take turns shooting at the running deer. After each individual shoots, their score is totaled and radioed up to the officials' table. The highest score of the relay wins a prize. The shooter is positioned 25 yards away from a hanging deer silhouette, which is positioned at the right side of the gallery. Round count and order may change from relay to relay. Our usual starting sequence is 2 shots at the deer



standing still and 2 shots while the deer is running. Once the final standing shoot is fired, the deer will begin to run across the gallery from right to left. Firearms allowed: Handguns, .22 Rifles and PCCs (Pistol Caliber Carbines). Pistols will compete against pistols; .22 Rifles and PPCs will compete among themselves. All type of sights or optics are allowed. This event is open to the public, and shooting starts at 12 noon. It's FUN! Bring a family member or a friend.








2023 (6th Annual) Tri-County Sportsmen Challenge

 A total number of 168 competitors travelled from six states and Canada:

Michigan – 100 Ohio – 28 Pennsylvania – 16 Indiana – 14 Ontario, Canada – 5 Illinois – 3 Kentucky – 2



- Competitors traveled a total of 38,960 miles (round trip) to attend the Challenge.
- Competitors traveled a total of 660 hours (round trip) to attend the Challenge.
- Estimating that two-thirds of the competitors carpooled (2 people per vehicle), 25,713 vehicle miles were driven (round trip) to attend the Challenge.
- Estimating that the average mpg was 25, 1,029 gallons of fuel were used (round trip) to attend the challenge.
- The minimum round count for the Challenge was 171.
- 168 competitors each shooting a minimum of 171 rounds would total 28,728 rounds.
- Knowing that many shooters made a few extra (make-up) shots, I would estimate that the total amount of ammo used for the event was over 30,000 rounds.
- Lunch was prepared and served on both Saturday and Sunday.
 During the 2 days, a total of 96 one-third pound hamburgers, 96 one-third pound hot dogs, and 96 one-third pound brats were prepared and served. That makes a total of 96 pounds of meat that was cooked on the grills.
- The Challenge Facebook Page (<u>www.facebook.com/tcscidpa</u>) currently has more than 800 followers.
- The Facebook Page has reached more than 9,000 people in the last month.
- · Please visit and follow the Challenge Facebook Page.
- We have yet to calculate the total volunteer hours used to put on the event. We estimate it will be 2,000 hours or more. We thank all the volunteers that helped to make this a successful event.

Hunter Education

CONGRATULATIONS MICHIGAN HUNTERS: In 2022 there were only four hunting related incidences. None of which were fatal! So keep up the good work out there this year.

One of the things we do need to work on is treestand safety as injures from elevated hunting is now the No. 1 way hunters are being hurt. According to the Treestand Safety Association, treestand accidents are the No. 1 cause of injuries and deaths to deer hunters.

Below, you will find some helpful tips from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service on how to be safe when hunting from a treestand.

- 1. Before the hunt, know your equipment. Read and understand the manufacturer's instructions and warnings before you use your treestand and full-body harness (FBH).
- 2. Check stands (including straps and chains) every season and before each use for signs of wear, fatigue, cracks, missing nuts or bolts, and replace as necessary.
- 3. Practice at ground level with your treestand and FBH with another person present before the hunt.
- 4. Learn how to use your FBH with a suspension release device. Note: Waist belts or upper-body-only designs of safety harnesses should never be used and can cause death or serious injury.
- 5. Select the right tree for your stand. Select a healthy, straight tree that is the right size for your treestand. Check the tree for insect nests or animal dens. Avoid using climbing stands on smooth-barked trees, especially during icy or wet conditions.
- 6. Clear debris from the base of the tree to minimize injury from a fall and to ensure a safe base if using a ladder stand.
- 7. Know your limitations. If you feel sleepy or unsure about the climb, a ground blind will provide you a safe alternative.
- 8. Have a hunt plan. Let a reliable person know where you will be when you will return and who is with you. Plans and maps make it easier for others to find you in the event of a mishap.
- 9. During the hunt, wear an FBH. Simply owning an FBH does not make you safe, you must take it out of your pack and wear it.
 10. Make sure your FBH is attached to the tree as soon as you begin to climb using climbing stands and/or climbing aids. In the case of ladder stands, attach the FBH before securing the platform to the tree or stepping onto it.

- 11. Wear an FBH at all times while using an elevated stand. Do not take chances. When climbing a ladder, keep three points of contact with the ladder at all times. Both hands and a foot or both of your feet and one hand should be used to support your body weight when using a ladder. When using a platform stand, climb higher than the stand and then step down onto the platform. Slowly put your weight onto your stand to be sure of your balance.
- 12. Use boots with non-slip soles to avoid slipping, especially in wet weather.
- 13. Never carry equipment when climbing. Use a haul line to raise and lower equipment.
- 14. In the stand, properly adjust your FBH. Whether standing or sitting, keep the tether line distance (between you and the tree) as short as possible with no slack in the tether while in the seated position. This will minimize the distance in case of a fall.
- 15. Use a haul line. Always raise and lower your firearm, bow or other equipment with a haul line. Make sure firearms are unloaded before attaching to a haul line, and do not attach the haul line near the trigger or trigger guard. Make sure broadheads are covered prior to raising or lowering a bow with a haul line.
- 16. If you fall, stay calm. By planning, you can avoid additional problems.
- 17. Have emergency equipment such as a knife, cell phone, flashlight, and/or whistle on your person.
- 18. Practice the Three Rs: Recover, Relief, Rescue. Attempt to recover and return to your stand. If this is not possible, exercise your legs by pushing against the tree, using another form of motion or your suspension relief device until help arrives.
- 19. Call for help immediately.

Each year thousands of lives nationwide are changed forever by treestand accidents. Keep these tips in mind to increase your chances of having an accident.
