Earl Austin and Jeff Gage were term-limited after years on the TCSL Board. Both contributed a lot to TCSL without asking for recognition or drawing attention to themselves. Earl was helpful in expanding the IDPA events at TCSL and helpful at Women on Target and Kids on the Range. Day. Jeff also helped at events at the Club, and in addition, it was not uncommon to see him in the kitchen at Steak Fries or Breakfasts. Most importantly, both Earl and Jeff have been long-term members; and their perspectives on Board issues over the years have been extremely helpful due to the institutional history/perspective they brought to TCSL.

Stuart, Mark, Earl, and Jeff leave big holes in TCSL operations and will be missed. Nice job, gentlemen.

Jim Walter will remain 1st Vice President, John Harden will remain Treasurer, Charlie Unbehaun will remain Membership Secretary, and Fred Girbach will remain Recording Secretary. Re-elected to the TCSL Board were Tom Lewandowski and Dave Vandermark. Vic Cheverette and Dick Cupka are new Board members.

For decades, TCSL has survived because of its members and their willingness to volunteer. Officers and Board members put in a tremendous of hours "behind the scenes." Members and Associate Members put in countless hours as Event Chairs, Committee Chairs, Event Volunteers, Committee Volunteers, etc. I have always maintained the belief that, when we are looking at our list of assets, the most valuable one is missing: the TCSL Family. I personally would like to thank all of the members, whether officer or Board members stepping down, members stepping up to the Board, volunteers helping in countless roles, etc. It is an understatement to say TCSL would not be here today if it weren't for its TCSL family.

Now we need to address two major issues that members need to help us solve. The first is that a member needs to step up to be 2nd Vice President. The 2nd Vice President is responsible for Club rentals. We all know that Club rental income has been one of the major fundraisers for TCSL for a long time. If we don't have Club rentals, or they aren't properly handled, TCSL will see a major loss of income. The second major issue is that we need to find a Club Manager. The Club Manager is critical to the daily oversight and maintenance of TCSL. The position is frequently referred to as "the face of TCSL." It is the only paid position offered at TCSL. The position could be filled (as it traditionally has been) by one person, or duties could be divided between two people. The hours are Wednesday through Saturday, 10am to 6pm.

Please direct any and all questions concerning filling the 2nd Vice President and Club Manager positions to me. I am quite confident that, if we all put our heads together, we can promptly fill these positions. After all, TCSL is an outstanding Club with awesome members and great facilities.

Keep monitoring the newsletter over the next few months. Look at the TCSL membership numbers. With your help, we are going to make some significant increases in those numbers over the next few months, which will allow TCSL to add some new activities. Be safe, and I will see you at TCSL.

Our next Winter Rifle Bench Match will be held in January 2025 and will be open to all TCSL members and guests. Our next match for 2024 is Saturday, March 16, and is a 22LR March Madness bench match. See the calendar for further description. Registration starts at 9am and the match begins at 10am. A short safety briefing will be held prior to the match. Fees for the match will be \$10 for members and \$15 for guests. You can compete with any style rifle (no full autos), foreign or domestic, modern or vintage, with iron sights or scope.

The winter matches are conducted from the bench rest, and course of fire is 10 rounds sight-in over a period of 10 minutes followed by 10 rounds for score over a period of 8 minutes. Highest score wins. Bring 20 rounds of safe ammunition, safety or shooting glasses, hearing protection, registration fee and appropriate warm clothing. A spotting scope is useful, and you may also bring rests or other positioning gear. Some blocks and sand bags are available. No rear bags or rests will be used.

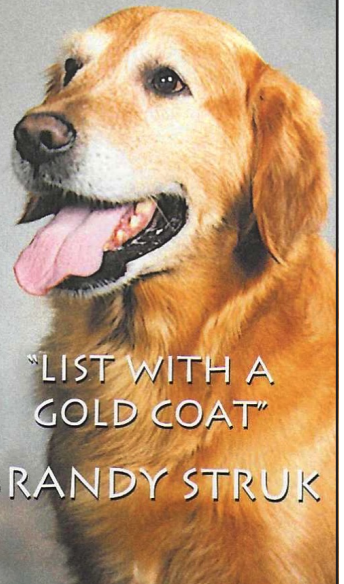

Hunters Education

When taking the hunter's education student exam, the most often missed question is #46:

#46. You can obtain a summary of the hunting regulation for Michigan at _____

- A. Any of the following locations
- B. Michigan DNR Operations Service Centers/District Offices
- C. Michigan DNR website
- D. Stores which sell hunting licenses

A. Is the answer. But that answer is not complete. You can also get the "Hunting Regulation Book" (formerly called "Hunting Digest") from the Michigan DNR Hunt Fish mobile app.

Michigan DNR Hunt Fish, an official app of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, gives you a mobile path to buy and store hunting, fishing, ORV, and snowmobile licenses and permits; report harvests; access guides and digests; and get the latest outdoor recreation updates.

The app is a one-stop shop for:

- Purchasing licenses and permits.
- Reporting harvests.

- Looking up regulations and guides.
- Finding your license history, including point/chance balances.
- Registering for Outdoor Skills Academy classes.
- Checking out maps with multiple layers, including places like boat launches.
- Receiving timely and important DNR messages.
- Maps of Michigan's public boat launches, state forest campgrounds, state parks and shooting ranges
- Current weather conditions and sunrise/sunset tables before heading out on the water or in the field.

It has never been easier to get DNR licenses and information. Download the free app and get started today!

So get with it, get the app! You can still get all those things the old-fashioned way, but why? I know, cell phones and hunting in the great outdoors seem wrong in some sort of way, but it is the way the up-and-coming are doing it.

Member Musings

The NRA has a regular column called "Favorite Firearms." NRA members submit a pic of the "old gun" and a short story describing why it is important to them. Sometimes it's a gun with some monetary value but usually, the "real value" of the gun is because of the memories it can conjure up, maybe it was the first gun a person owned or the connection it preserves with someone from their past. Here is a quick story about one of my favorite guns.

The first gun I was allowed to carry was Stevens Model 15. This is a single-shot 22 that shoots short, long, and long rifle cartridges. You could chamber a round but had to cock the gun by pulling back the round knob on the back. After cocking, it was ready to fire.

Beginning sometime while I was in elementary school, my dad would take me along when he went hunting and I got to carry the rifle unloaded. It was his way of training me how to handle a firearm. I wasn't old enough to legally hunt but I didn't care, I was out in the field or the woods with my dad.

We would hunt as long as daylight allowed and often got home after shooting hours. If time permitted, Dad would set up an empty can I got to shoot a few rounds at the can before we headed for the house. This was a pretty big deal for a kid my age. Much of the land we hunted has houses on it now so those long, meandering trips along the riverbanks are a thing of the past. Some of my favorite memories are of those fall evenings hunting with my dad.

The gun was a permanent fixture in the barn until recently. During Dad's last days, he and I talked about the gun and he couldn't recall where he acquired it. "I just always had it," he told me. I've cleaned it up and now store it in my gun safe. The gun still goes bang and the rounds still hit the target if I do my part. It has little monetary value but much sentimental value to me. It'll get passed on to a family member someday.

No doubt many TCSL members have a similar story about one of their firearms. It would be great if you could share those stories with the rest of us. The editor will help you put that story together if need be.

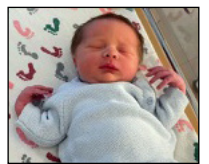

On this Day in History

Mar 1, 1932 - The 20-month-old son of aviation pioneer Charles A. Lindbergh was kidnapped from his home in Hopewell, New Jersey. Although the Lindberghs paid a \$50,000 ransom, the boy's body was found in a wooded area a few miles from the house more than two months later.

Mar 1, 1961 - President John F. Kennedy established the Peace Corps.

Mar 1, 1904 (d. 1944) - American band leader Glenn Miller On December 15, 1944, his plane disappeared over the English Channel while en route to Paris where he was scheduled to perform.

Mar 3, 1913 (d. 1897) - Railroad car builder George Pullman was born in Brocton, New York. He improved railroad sleeping accommodations, developing the folding upper berth and lower berth designs.

Mar 3, 1847 (d. 1922) - Telephone inventor Alexander Graham Bell was born in Edinburgh, Scotland.

Mar 4, 1888 (d. 1931) - American football legend Knute Rockne was born in Voss, Norway. He coached the Notre Dame Football team for 13 seasons and became famous for his locker room pep talks and the saying, "Win one for the Gipper."

Mar 6, 1836 - Fort Alamo fell to Mexican troops led by General Santa Anna.

Mar 10, 1862 - The first issue of U.S. government paper money occurred as \$5, \$10 and \$20 bills began circulation.

Mar 10, 1880 - The Salvation Army was founded in the United States.

March 11, 1918 - The 'Spanish' influenza first reached America as 107 soldiers became sick at Fort Riley, Kansas. One quarter of the U.S. population eventually became ill from the deadly virus, resulting in 500,000 deaths. The death toll worldwide approached 22 million by the end of 1920.

March 12, 1888 - The Great Blizzard of '88 struck the northeastern U.S. The storm lasted 36 hours with snowfall totaling over 40 inches in New York City where over 400 persons died from the surprise storm.

Mar 14, 1879 (d. 1955) - Albert Einstein (1879-1955) was born in Ulm, Germany.

March 15, 44 B.C. - Julius Caesar was assassinated in the Senate chamber in Rome by Brutus and fellow conspirators.

March 16, 1968 - New York Senator Robert Kennedy announced his intention to run for the Democratic presidential nomination.

Mar 19, 1848 (d. 1929) - Wyatt Earp was born in Monmouth, Illinois. He is best known for the shootout at the O.K. Corral in 1881.

Mar 20, 1685 (d. 1750) - Organist and composer Johann Sebastian Bach was born in Eisenach, Germany.

Mar 22, 1972 - The Equal Rights Amendment to the U.S. Constitution was passed by the U.S. Senate and then sent to the states for ratification.

Mar 23, 1775 - Patrick Henry ignited the American Revolution with a speech before the Virginia convention in Richmond, stating, "I know not what course others may take; but as for me, give me liberty, or give me death!"

March 24, 1989 - One of the largest oil spills in U.S. history occurred as the oil tanker Exxon Valdez ran aground in Prince William Sound off Alaska, resulting in 11 million gallons of oil leaking into the natural habitat over a stretch of 45 miles.

Mar 24, 1874 (d. 1926) - Harry Houdini was born (as Erik Weisz) in Budapest, Hungary. He became a world famous escape artist, known for escaping from chains, handcuffs, straightjackets, locked boxes and milk cans filled with water. He died on Halloween 1926 from a burst appendix and was buried in Queens, NY.

Mar 25, 1911 - A raging fire erupted inside a garment factory in New York City killing 123 young women employed as low-paid seamstresses, along with 23 men.

Mar 26, 1911 (d. 1983) - American playwright Tennessee Williams was born in Columbus, Mississippi.

March 28, 1979 - Near Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, the Three Mile Island nuclear power plant accident occurred, resulting in the release of radioactive steam into the atmosphere.

Mar 30, 1981 - Newly elected President Ronald Reagan was shot in the chest while walking toward his limousine in Washington, D.C., following a speech inside a hotel. "I should have ducked," Reagan joked.

Mar 30, 1853 (d. 1890) - Vincent Van Gogh (1853-1890) was born in Groot Zundert, Holland. He was a Postimpressionist painter, generally considered the greatest Dutch painter after Rembrandt.

Mar 31, 1732 (d. 1809) - Franz Joseph Haydn born in Rohrau, Austria.

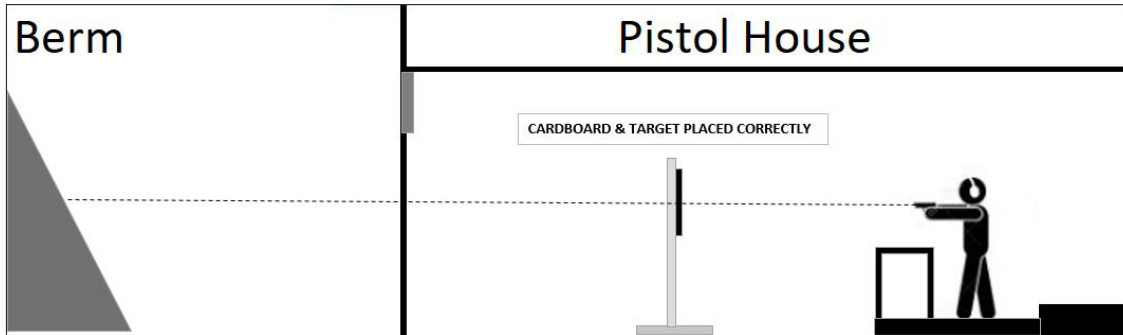

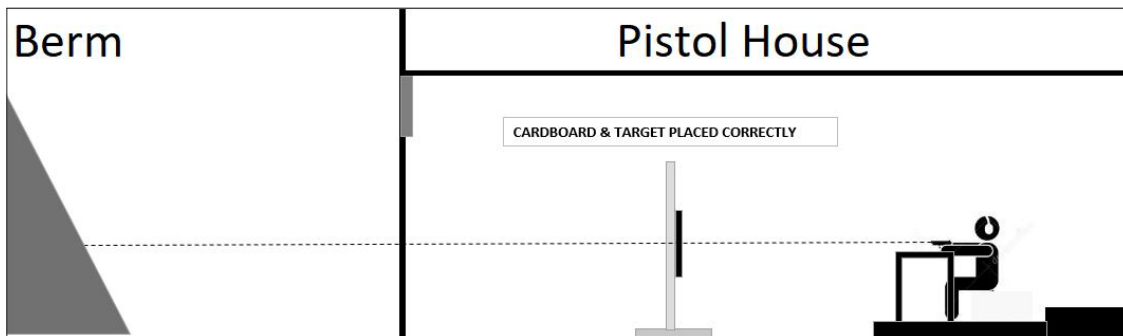
Target Alignment: A Top Priority!

At Tri-County target placement and sight alignment are very important to the overall safety of our ranges. Knowing your target and what is behind it is one of the fundamentals of safe shooting.

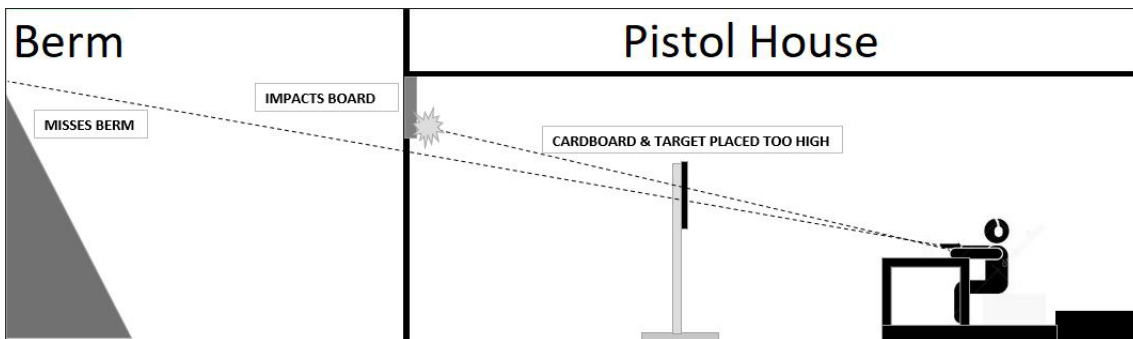
In the Pistol House we strive to place the cardboard target backers at the correct standing positions for average shooters, however people come in all sizes.



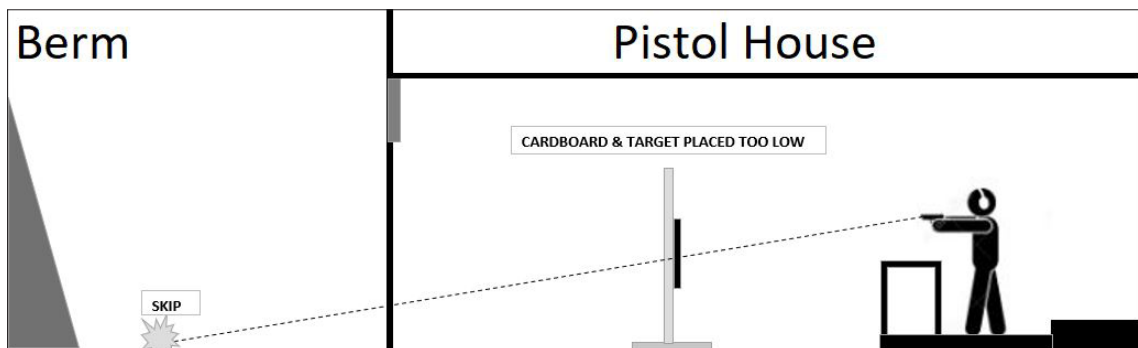
Many people enjoy shooting while seated or sighting in their pistols using a bench rest. This requires the cardboard and target to be placed at a lower position to properly impact the berm.



It is very important to remember to lower the cardboard and target to ensure proper target alignment, failing to do so can result in damage to the building or missing the berm entirely.



We ask that if you lower the cardboard for sitting you replace it to the original higher position when you have completed shooting. Shooters have been observed negligently shooting at low cardboard from a standing position. Remember you must always check your target alignment to prevent skips, this is especially important in the winter when the ground may be frozen.
